Chainsaw Safety

This one-day course will include classroom and field demonstration of proper chainsaw techniques. Topics included in the classroom portion of the class and reinforced in the field will include overall chainsaw program safety, PPE, maintenance of equipment to reduce downtime, sharpening the chain, reactive forces, directional felling, limbing and bucking, spring poles, use of wedges, and storm damage and removal.

The course content and the field demonstration will provide an introduction to the topic including terminology and techniques and serve as a refresher for those with experience. Safety is stressed throughout the day.
